Increased Membership Equals Greater Accomplishment By Fred Middleton, Editor

The Mississippi District contributed 229 new members to help Supreme reach a record membership of 1,763,182 in the 2007-08 Fraternal Year. Supreme's goal for the state was exceeded by five new members.

For the new year, Supreme's goal for Mississippi is a 5 percent growth in membership, meaning 295 new members. State Deputy Danny Lechner, State Membership Director Billy Waggoner and, indeed, the entire leadership, are placing great emphasis on recruitment and retention in this year's program of work.

"Our No. 1 goal is to grow," Lechner said in his report to Schools of Columbianism attendees. "We can accomplish so much more with more people in our councils."

"Personal contact is the key," says Waggoner. "We must make prospects understand that we really want them and need them as Brother Knights to help further our mission."

An interesting statistic noted in reports is that the state has 325 inactive insurance members. These associates are enrolled in the K of C insurance program but have allowed their council memberships to expire.

"These individuals are great targets for our recruiters," Lechner noted. "By bringing them back into the membership, not only do we reactive a member but we hold on to an insured."

- Honor each proposer at the monthly meeting or in the council newsletter.
- Consult the "Knights in Action" section of Columbia magazine to get ideas about service programs that can attract new members
- Have the Grand Knight ask three council members as a personal favor to each propose a new member.
- Ask each council member to submit the names of three prospective members to the membership director.
- · Be sure that each member has a Form 100 in his wallet - you never know when a prospect will appear.
- Make sure that your council has a clear membership goal that is communicated to the entire council membership.
- Include a prospect referral card with the monthly newsletter mailing.

Hearing the Call

If God is your co-pilot, then you're sitting in the wrong seat.

If "hearing the call" means truly listening and following the Lord, then we should be surprised from time to time where that takes us, since we are not in the driver's seat.

Two of our seminarians, Chris Buse and Grant Holzhauer, have decided not to return to the seminary this fall. Chris has just graduated from St. Joseph Seminary College, and Grant finished the first of four years of graduate theology. Both received favorable evaluations and made good grades this past semester; they simply are not sure at this time God is calling them to the priesthood, after having done the work of much discernment.

Rather than enter into a "pastoral year" in a parish supervised by the diocese as is done sometimes, they have decided to explore other options on their own. Chris will be teaching in St. Aloysius in Vicksburg this fall, and Grant is seeking church-related employment, probably outside of Mississippi. Sometimes in order to discern well one has to make a complete break, step away entirely, and from that new vantage point take a look at one's life. (Bishop Houck often shared with others his own experience of having taken some time away from the seminary in order to discern his calling.)

Will God call them back to seminary formation in the future? Only God knows. Their leaving is not a scandal, but a normal part of the overall vocations picture—more common among college seminarians than among those in graduate theology. I often tell men and women that they do not have to be 100 percent certain before entering preparation for the priesthood or religious life; sometimes beginning formation is the <u>only</u> way to finally know for sure.

Please know that your prayers and financial support for Chris and Grant have not been wasted. Even if they do not become priests someday, their seminary formation will bear good fruit for the Church in whatever way they serve and practice their faith.

Some leave and some arrive. We have just accepted a new seminarian, Adam Nobles from St. Alphonsus McComb, who just graduated from Parklane Academy. Adam will be following a new kind of formation process—enrolling as a freshman at Mississippi State University, living in a dorm there, and being involved in parish and campus ministry, along with receiving periodic direction and formation. It is envisioned that, God willing, he will later transfer to St. Joseph Seminary College to take the necessary hours in philosophy and complete his bachelor's degree, before going on to graduate theology formation.

Also arriving later this summer, from Guatemala, will be seminarian Juan Chavajay (a relative of Lorenzo Aju, Pastoral Minister of St. John in Eupora, Miss.). Juan has almost finished seminary in his home country, and will be coming here to learn English and work in our diocese in order for him to discern, along with us, if God is truly calling him to be a "missionary" in Mississippi. And Fr. Lenin Vargas has been following the application process with several seminarians from Morelia, Mexico; if accepted, they will be supported in Mexico for a couple of years until they finish philosophy, after which they will be brought to our diocese to finish English language studies and begin theology.

Newly ordained Fr. Lincoln Dall has begun serving as Associate Pastor of St. Richard, Jackson, and seminarian Charles Macko has graduated from Notre Dame Seminary and begun a parish internship in Natchez prior to diaconate and priesthood ordination in 2009.

So if I give you a blank look when you ask me, "How many seminarians do we have?" please forgive me. Things are in a state of flux, and will soon settle down for the fall. Please just keep the faith, keep praying, and keep inviting women and men to think about a life of service as a sister, brother, or priest. And if you haven't already, move over—let God be the pilot!

Young Seminarian Recollects His Calling to the Priesthood

(The newest seminarian for the Jackson Diocese, Adam Nobles, is a freshman at Mississippi State University, experiencing secular college in preparation for seminary and following a program of discernment and being mentored as part of his unique formation process. He reflects on how he experienced "the call" in this article for The Magnolia Knight.)

I am the last of five children and am blessed with two amazing people as my parents, Dr. James and Penny Nobles. Originally from Louisiana, we moved to McComb. MS. when I was

My story of discernment is both simple and complicated at the same time-a mystery. Being born into a Catholic family and community in Louisiana, I was always surrounded by Catholicism. But I did not truly know what it means to be Catholic until I actually had to defend the faith when we moved to McComb and I attended a predominately Protestant school. Little did I know that it would be the Protestants' questions that would make me start to research and realize how awesome our faith is. By my freshman year of high school, I had become fully immersed in the different doctrines of our faith.

My understanding changed, however, when I went to a retreat which made me realize the greatest Truth I would ever know. The theme was "Rise Up a Catholic Revolution"—part of a series sponsored by Franciscan University,

Supporting Our Seminarians By Deacon Larry Campbell State Vocations Chair

When a seminarian is adopted by a Council, Assembly, Ladies' Auxiliary or Columbian Squires Circle, he receives financial assistance from the adopting Knights of Columbus unit. Let me say, however, that in order to walk the walk and not just talk the talk, we must also provide moral support to that individual. This means exhibiting a willingness to remember him in our prayers, corresponding on a regular basis and scheduling visitations. It is recommended that we have written communication at least four times per year and at least one personal contact per year. In this way, besides providing financial assistance, RSVP creates bonds of friendship between Knights and future priests, many of whom join the Order and become chaplains as a result.

We should invite these men to our activities, particularly those who are studying nearby or when they return home for a visit. Names and addresses of each seminarian studying for both the Diocese of Biloxi and the Diocese of Jackson are provided in this column. Even though a Knights of Columbus unit may not have financially adopted a specific seminarian, each unit is encouraged to communicate with these men. Fr. Dennis Carver. Diocesan Vocations Director for the Diocese of Biloxi (carver@holyfamilyparish.cc), and Fr. Kent Bowlds, Diocesan Vocations Director for the Diocese of Jackson (frkent@bellsouth.net), will be happy to provide these seminarians' birthdates and any other specific information they feel is appropriate. We can also remember them during Advent, Thanksgiving, the Christmas Season, the Lenten Season, Holy Week, the Triduum and Easter, as well as during Ordinary Time. These men need our support. They may well be our future shepherds.

It is my hope that we can all pull together in this endeavor. I do request, however, that each diocese support its own seminarians unless asked to do otherwise by Fr. Carver or Fr. Bowlds.

Steubenville. Before this experience, I didn't really know my purpose as a young Catholic. On the Saturday night of that retreat I recalled something from my childhood—mom and myself sitting in the back of a church praying to Mary—and in that retreat's moment of recollection, I felt Mary was calling me to become like her son and give up my life for the Church!

After that night nothing was the same ever again. I knew my purpose and I knew that I could not be afraid of the road that was laid before me (as Pope John Paul II often encouraged us).

Have I fallen or done some really ignorant things since then? Yes, I have, but a phrase I like to live by is that the difference between a saint and a sinner is that the saint gets back up and tries his hardest to learn from his mistakes.

I know that many adults and young people will read this and think it is just another nice, good story that has nothing to do with them. However I would like you to challenge yourselves even more to seek out the truth in your own lives and, most importantly, seek out who you are as a person made in the image of God. This is discernment and it is not just for seminarians! The road ahead of all of us can be hard and become even more difficult as we grow in faith, but God pours out his graces upon us all. I pray that we may all seek out the things that draw us close to God, and grab hold of the truth that *nothing can separate us from the love of God* (Romans 8: 31-38). This, I believe, is the answer to the great question of the mystery of life. I hope I can help others realize this by bringing them closer to Christ.
