MARCH 25 IS DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE UNBORN CHILD BY DENNIS AND MUNA RIECKE, STATE PROLIFE COUPLE

The Knights of Columbus Day for the Unborn Child is March 25, and Councils are asked to hold a special prayer service or conduct a prolife Mass or rosary service in their Parishes on or around this day. Councils should consult with their pastor to establish the time and type of service.

This event should be publicized to encourage Parish and community participation. The Supreme Council has a variety of materials that can be used with the Day of the Unborn Child activities. These include: "Prayer for Life" cards (No.4665); "Winning Words of Life," a four-page flyer (No. 2275); "A People of Life -And for Life" brochure (No.4795) and poster (#4804); "Pray the Rosary to End Abortion" prayer card (No.2075) and poster (No.2073); and "Gospel of Life" prayer card (No.4237 in English or Spanish) and poster (No.4238). All materials are available from the KC Supply Department for no charge when ordered in reasonable quantities. More information on the KC Day for the Unborn Child is available at the "community" section of kofc.org/service

Although time is running out, there is still time to complete two prolife activities for the State program year. Councils can participate in Supreme's Day for the Unborn Child and by making a donation of at least \$100 to the Mississippi Memorial Prolife Fund.
